The winter season is finally coming to an end at Galt. Basketball, hockey and Cross Country ski teams are preparing to hand in their uniforms and commence relaxing.

A terrific performance was put on by our Senior Boys Hockey team at John Abbott College on March 4th, 1989. For the first time in 16 years the Galt Pipers walked away with the Championship title.

Galt was ranked only second going into the Provincial Playoffs, whereas John Rennie had only lost one league game.

"During the last two weeks, everything fell into place," said head coach Brian Heath, "the team was playing well and we were confident. It was like riding a wave going into the Provincials.

Galt was victorious over Howard S. Billings, 5-3, and over Lower Canada College, 4-3, a close game all the way.

Going into the final game, Galt was geared and hungry. Many great scoring advantages were given to Galt. The turnaround of the game came when goaltender, Terry Smith made two quick glove saves followed by two goals for Galt. Goaltender Terry Smith was definitely a large key to the final score of 5-3 for Galt. Smith was MVP in the game against John Rennie. Shawn Demers was also a very strong scorer in this game.

"There are many keys to winning a hockey game, goaltending, offense, coaching, etc," commented Heath, "but the one that I want to emphasize is our defense. Steve McKell, Wayne Lassenba, Steve Keeble, and cont'd page 2

Heath also commented on the good forechecking by Darryl Thompson, Jeff Grapes, and Mike Gradu.

"Not much is ever said about everyone else who helped us along the way." Heath said, "Smith and Demers will be remembered but there's also assistant coach Bob Halsall, manager Jarret Archer, (who wasn't up for comment), manager Jeff Bean, fans, parents, and the rest of the team who played great!"

Goaltender Terry Smith will definitely be remembered for his outstanding work throughout the season.

When asked how he felt going into the final game against John Rennie, he smiled and said, "Nervous."

"We were confident. We played well and stuck together. It was a team effort." Smith said.

"We just used our superior talents," commented Tim Call.

As far as the future is concerned with Smith, hockey may be somewhere in there.

"A big thanks goes to the fans who were with us on Saturday and throughout the season. Also to Nancy Richard and Gloria Scott who organized the fan bus," Smith said.

Smith was constantly referring to the rest of the team, especially the defence, who were "great" in his eyes.

"Winning this championship is definitely the highlight of my teaching career," Heath smiled, "we worked hard, it seemed to go uphill all the way. It just all came together at the right time."

The Senior Girls Basketball team wasn't as fortunate as the hockey team yet walked away with a consolation victory.

Galt played against Chateauguay Valley Regional who won 46-40, then came MacDonald who lost to Galt 51-8. The final game was played against Gaspe with Galt winning 41-26.

"They played extremely well," commented W. Rourke, head coach, "There was a good defence and the team rebounded very well."

Tiffany Crook, who scored 23 points and 23 rebounds, was nominated MVP for the All Stars. Amy Sharman was also superb, with 20 points and 26 rebounds.

The Senior Boys Basketball team lost their game to Centennial 57-50 and also to Philemonh Wright 44-39. They were winners against Laval Catholic 67-45.

The bantam boys hockey team has finished the season with a 5-5 record. They were unable to beat B.C.S.

"The team had a variety of ability, from cuts made from the Senior hockey team to twelve year olds," said Ernie Garbutt, head coach.

Steve McKell played only two games with the Bantam team before joining the Senior team. Tim Smith, a stronger player, was only able to play in the first few games before he was benched with a skiing injury.

"We had strong lines of forwards," said R. Stymeist, coach, "John Letourneau, Mark Deboer, Kevin Warren, and Cutting."

As far as the defense went, Peter Murray controlled much of the strength needed to keep the opposition away from goaltender Jason Morse.

"It could have been a better team if everyone had shown up for games and if there had been team co-operation. Yet the goaltending improved alot from the beginning," commented Tim Smith.

"Overall," Garbutt remarked, " for the first season, it went well."

The nets are up and birds are flying as badminton starts off the upcoming spring season.


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POLITICS HIT GALT!


You entered so silently,

Hoping the world falls to the claws of destruction.


