PRIZES

The following prizes are offered for competition during the school year:—In the A. A. class there are three prizes offered to the pupil coming highest in the June examinations. 1st, a Silver Cup, presented by the School Commissioners; 2nd and 31d, Books.

In Grade II Academy, two medals are offered for competition, one by the E. T. Bank to the pupil coming highest in the June examinations, another by Mr. George Moynan, to the pupil taking the highest marks, who has been in the grade only one year. Second and third prizes of books. In I Academy, a medal for first place, and books for second and third place. In Grades III and II Model, the same is offered as for Grade I Academy. All Grades below II Model receive books, as first, second and third prizes.

SCHOLARSHIPS

This year, through the generosity of some public-spirited citizens, the Academy is able to offer some cash prizes for competition in the higher grades. In order to obtain these, the pupil must not only obtain the highest marks in the June examinations, but must also obtain the highest average in the weekly examinations, held throughout the year.

In III Acad. a prize of \$5.00 donated by the Manager of the Molsons Bank, will be offered to the best pupil in general proficiency. In II Acad. a first prize of \$10.00 offered by the Principal to the best pupil in general proficiency, [the said pupil to signify his or her intention of completing the A.A. course in this Academy], a second prize of \$5.00 donated by Mr. Gardner Stevens will be given the second best pupil.

In I Acad. two prizes each of the value of \$5.00, given by Mr. Stevens will be awarded the pupils coming first and second respectively. In III Model, \$5.00 will be given the pupil coming first, by Mr. George Robinson.

PREFECTS.

These boys have been given full charge of the discipline of the school during play-hours and intermissions. The system has been found to work very well, the boys chosen are generally the most representative in the school, who, by example and repreced, instil into the rest of the boys the idea that they must behave and uphold the honour of the school. Any boy, who does any thing, which is unworthy of the position of prefect, is, of course, at once disqualified.

ATHLETICS.

A liberal education is promised to those attening Waterloo Academy, the body must be developed as well as the mind. After all, the ultimate aim of education is the formation of character, it is almost impossible to have a sound mind without a sound body. No system of education is thorough which permits a development along one line only, to the detriment of the rest of the body. To this end; viz. that the body and mind may be developed equally, the staff considers it fitting to encourage a legitimate use of athletics. This year a Field Day was held, for the first time, on the Academy grounds. Friday, the 2nd September was an ideal day for such an event and the pupils enjoyed and appreciated the afternoon thoroughly. Through the kindness of the citizens of Waterloo enough money was subscribed to admit of suital le prizes being presented.


3.—The fees are much lower than in other Academies of the size and standing.


