# FINALS OF E. T. BONSPIEL

## White Wins La Tribune, Weir Takes Webster And Cunningham Cops Downs, Hamilton Record, Lothrop Mitchell

W. B. White's Oshawa rink won the La Tribune trophy, J. S. Hamilton's Lennoxville foursome took the Sherbrooke Daily Record, J. Cunningham's Thetford Mines squad copped the H. W. S. Downs, D. Weir's Pointe Claire quartet won the Webster Motors and N. Lothrop's Sherbrooke aggregation walked off with the J. S. Mitchell and Company trophy events in the finals Saturday evening in the fifth annual Eastern Townships Bonspiel.

Bill White's Ontario crew settled right down to work and rolled off the first six ends in flawless fashion as they chalked up six consecutive points to give R. Masse's Granby foursome a lesson in the art of drawing, guarding and building up a house. From then on it was a matter of just protecting their early lead. Masse's rink picked up a three-end and then a singleton in the eighth to have the score read 7-4. White's quartet came through with another well figured end to get one in and had it well protected. When Skip Masse came to shoot he couldn't get to it and Oshawa gathered one more on Pilot White's last toss to cop the tilt 9-4.

In the Mitchell trophy between Nelson Lothrop and Bruce Miller it was all one sided as Lothrop's rink was on their game while Miller's quartet just couldn't do anything right. Lothrop was out in front 8-2 at the end of the eighth and picked up another but at the start of the ninth Lothrop got one in and when four stones had gone through the house, Skip Miller conceded the match 10-3.

In the Daily Record event it was another one-sided affair as Duke Doucet and his Windsor outfit failed to show any of the finesse that had carried them to the finals and Stan Hamilton's Lennoxville foursome walked off with a 10-4 win. Hamilton's crew were ahead 6-3 in the sixth and added a three-pointer in the seventh with a singleton in the eighth to lead 10-2. Doucet's squad got two but in the final end they failed and the Lennoxville foursome copped the match.

At Lennoxville, Scotty Cunningham's Thetford rink took an early lead and maintained it the whole way. At the end of the eighth the

Miners were ahead 8-6 but Wes Nichol's quartet snared one. In the final end Cunningham's rink chalked one more to cop the match 10-7 in a close duel.

In the Webster affair it was a closely tilt the whole way and the issue was only decided in the last few ends. The Pte Claire quartet was off to a good start and was ahead 3-0 in the fourth. Bert Keeler's local foursome chalked up a two-pointer and then after a couple of ends the score was tied 7-7 at the end of the eighth. D. Weir's foursome got three in the house well guarded and managed to count and this proved the turning point. In the final end Pilot Keeler tried to close the gap but with the breaks against them the Pte Claire got two more to finish 12-7.

Immediately following the matches at Lennoxville and Sherbrooke the prizes and trophies were presented. At the local club Rollie Badger, general chairman of the bonspiel, presided and after a few words of thanks to the con-

testants he called upon Everett Nicol to present the La Tribune trophy, while Harry Petts awarded the J. S. Mitchell trophy and Len O'Donnell the Daily Record trophy.

At Lennoxville Howard Nichol, president of the Lennoxville Club, thanked all the competitors and called upon H. W. S. Downs to present his trophy while Charles Parkin awarded the Webster Motors trophy to the winning rink.

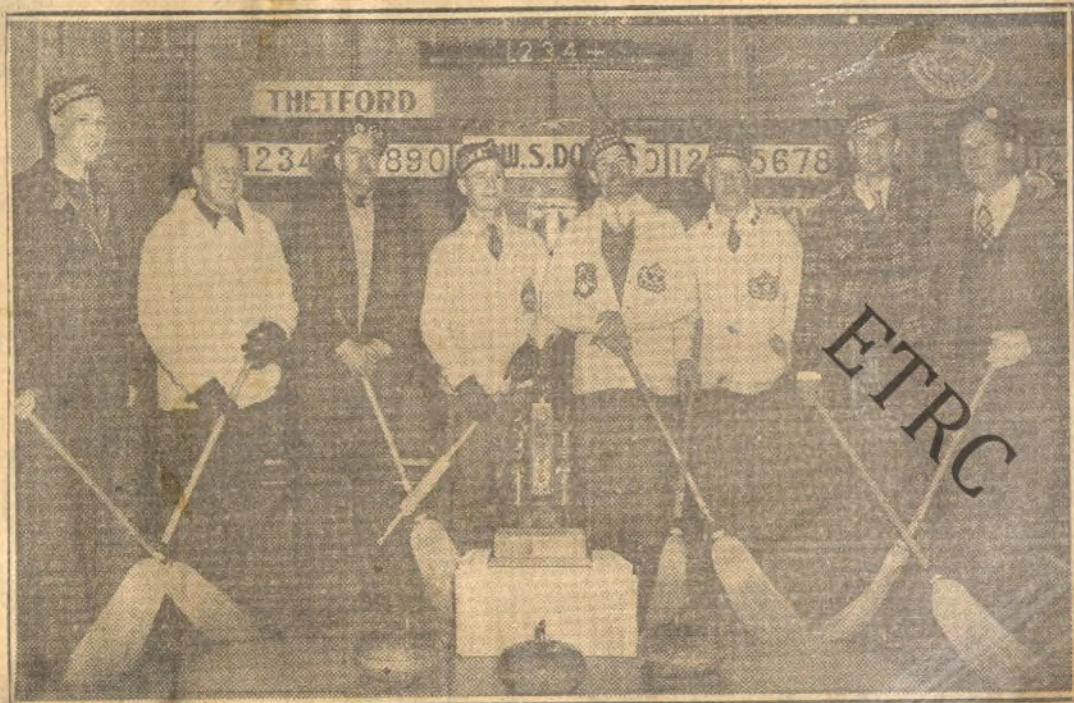
In the semi-finals of the Record trophy Stan Hamilton of Lennoxville came through with a 13-4 decision over W. Price of Pte Claire while Duke Doucet of Windsor Mills walked off with a 12-4 win over A. Paquette's Montreal West aggregation. In the Downs trophy Scotty Cunningham of Thetford Mines pulled his team through with a last stone victory to edge D. MacTavish of Lachute 9-8 in a very close match which was only decided by the final shot.

In the La Tribune, R. Masse of Granby guided his rink to a 17-1 victory against Everett Nicol's Sherbrooke team to win his way into the finals against White's Oshawa foursome. In the Mitchell section Jim Fuller's rink came up with a 9-4 victory over E. Martin's Huntingdon quartet while Nelson Lothrop of Sherbrooke downed Sid Cross' aggregation 10-6. Bert Keeler won his way into the finals of the Webster trophy with an 8-1 win over Frank Beaudry while D. Weir of Pte Claire got by Buster McLenahan of Windsor Mills 9-5 in a close match.

In the quarter-finals of the Webster section Bert Keeler downed Stan Cuthbert's rink 10-3 and Stew Roy eliminated Henri Bouchard's Jacques Cartier 10-1 but then dropped a 12-3 verdict to Bert Keeler. Gerry Burt chalked up a 13-3 win over Frank Gingras while Frank Beaudry downed H. Nichol 10-4 and D. Weir edged by Roy Wiggitt 8-7 while V. Lyon came through with a 12-6 victory against C. Skinner, and Buster McLenahan downed Gerry McManamy 8-2. Beaudry downed Burt 3-5 but then dropped an 8-1 decision to Bert Keeler.

### Windsor Qualifies In

### Langlois Rink Cops Howard Trophy; Ellwood Takes Armstrong, Laflamme Wins Elliott In Junior Bonspiel

Romeo Langlois' Magog rink copped the Senator Howard trophy in finals played Saturday evening of the fifth annual junior bonspiel sponsored by the Sherbrooke Curling Club while W. Ellwood, of Lennoxville, guided his foursome to victory in the Armstrong while Walter Laflamme, of Sherbrooke, won the Elliott Memorial trophy.

Langlois' quartet chalked up a 15-11 verdict over "Sonny" Mooney and his squad. The Magog aggregation staged a rally to emerge the winner. They were down 9-1 at the end of the fifth but at the end of the ninth they tie the count 11-11 and on the final end registered four points to cop the event 15-11 in a hard fought affair.

In the other section Walter Laflamme, of Sherbrooke, was forced the limit before he could dispose of L. Morgan and his East Angus squad 8-7. The match went an extra end.

Ossie Smith, of Sherbrooke, had a easy time when he chalked up a 13-0 win over W. Clifford's East Angus foursome. In the semi-finals Doherty's rink came through with a 11-7 victory to move into the finals.

### Stan Hamilton's Lennoxville Rink Takes District Caledonia Playoffs By Downing Drummondville In Finals

Stan Hamilton's Lennoxville rink won the right to represent the Eastern Townships in the Caledonia playdowns at Montreal yesterday afternoon when they dropped W. Philips' Drummondville foursome 19-7 at the Sherbrooke Curling Club.

The Lennoxville quartet jumped into an 11-5 lead at the end of the fifth, Drummondville picked up a singleton but Hamilton's aggregation came back with a two and a single point and in the ninth they snared two to move ahead 16-6 with the tenth end completed.

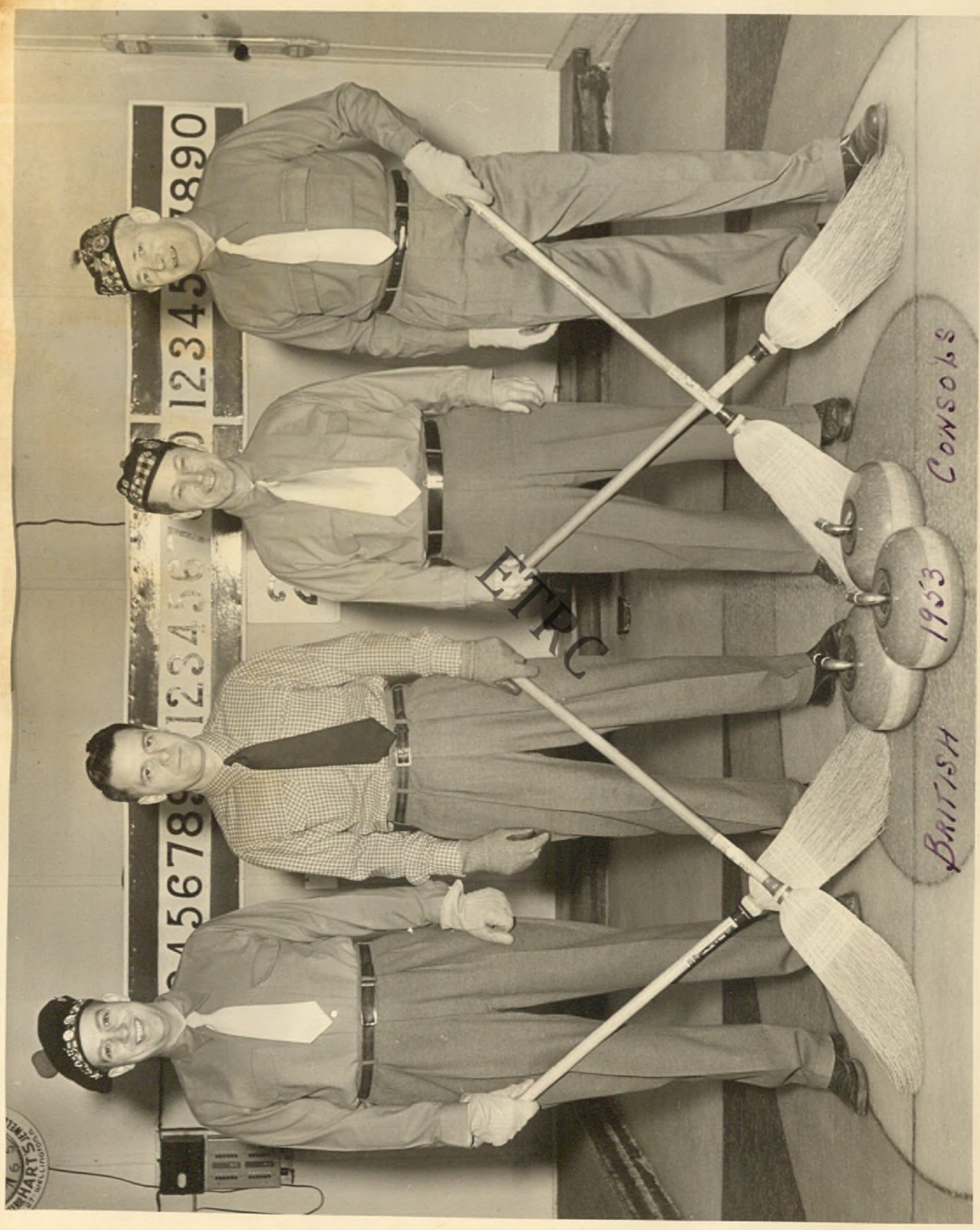

# Eastern Townships' British Consols Playdowns Open

## Seven Clubs Represented In Top Curling Event; Each Rink To Play Six Games; Starts Tomorrow At 3.00

The Eastern Townships District British Consols playdowns will open tomorrow afternoon with seven clubs competing in the event, stated Nelson Lothrop, chairman of the competition, yesterday afternoon.

The Townships is one of the ten districts of the Province who will compete in the annual event with the winner of the finals at Quebec taking part in the British

Consols championships. The local event will be run on the same lines as the one at Quebec which will be a round-robin affair with each rink playing six games and the foursome emerging with the largest number of wins will be declared the winner.

The following clubs will be represented in the local affair, Sherbrooke, Lennoxville, Richmond, Windsor Mills, Thetford Mines, Granby and Drummondville. L. Dwyer, Dr. J. Hibbard, S. Cross and Skip Jim Fuller will represent the Sherbrooke club while Stan Hamilton's quartet comprised of L. Varney, K. Lane and D. Bennett will carry the colors of the Lennoxville Club. Windsor's foursome is C. Hamel, W. McLennahan, M. Sears with Duke Doucet skipping the squad.

The first round of games will commence at 3.00 tomorrow afternoon at Windsor Mills, Sherbrooke and Lennoxville and the final three games are slated for the local club Sunday afternoon at 3.00.

Two games are scheduled for Lennoxville and one in Sherbrooke on the opening round while in the evening at 8.00 two will be held in Windsor and one in Sherbrooke. Saturday morning at 9.00 three games are on tap at the local club. In the afternoon at 2.30 two will be played in Lennoxville and one in Sherbrooke and in the evening two will take part in Windsor and one in Lennoxville.

Sunday morning two games are slated in Lennoxville and one in Sherbrooke at 9.30 with three final matches scheduled in the afternoon at the local club at 3.00. In case of a tie the rinks will play in the evening in Sherbrooke.

The combined score for the two twelve end matches was 23-20. Skip Richardson won by a score of 14-10 while skip Atto dropped a 10-9 decision to his opponents.

The Lennoxville curlers had

the advantage of being on familiar ice and took an early lead in the matches. Richardson's rink lead by a score of 10-2 at the halfway mark while Rupert Atto's crew was ahead 7-4 following a dead-end sixth. The Glebe curlers gained momentum in the last half and outscored the defenders, but Richardson's early lead was the margin of victory.

President Howard Moffatt spoke briefly following the game and welcomed the visiting rinks from Ottawa. The event was a popular win, drawing about 150 spectators. Prior to the games a delicious hot supper, prepared by Mrs. Ernie Cote, was served to the members by Dr. Tim Burton's kitchen committee.
